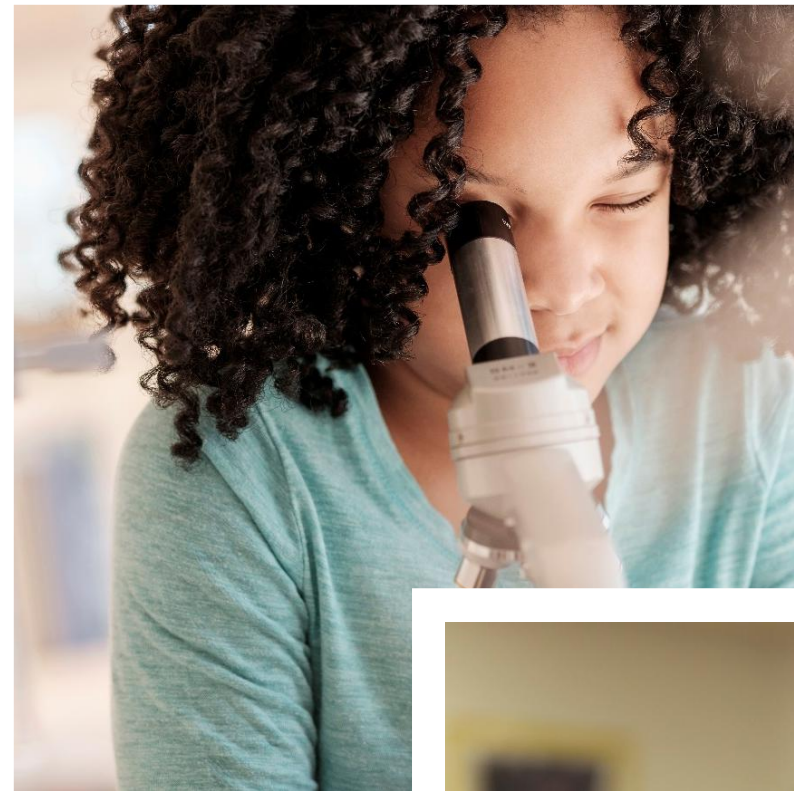

Why it matters

Health related illness and medical appointments are the biggest cause of authorized absence from school

Since the Covid epidemic, parents / carers are more cautious about sending their children to school.



We have also seen a rise in children and young people suffering with their mental health, and the impact of parental mental health on school / college absence.

Parents / carers are often confused about when they should send their son / daughter to school and are not always aware of the resources / support available to them.

What has led us in looking at health and attendance?

- Absence relating to illness suggests unmet/undiagnosed health needs
- Emotionally based school absence has increased
- Mental health is cited as a main cause of absence but lack of 'coding' makes this difficult to quantify and understand
- Parents are unsure about when to keep CYP off school
- Schools need to be supported to be confident in having health related discussions
- Health, education and the community need to work better together
- Public Health services need to be aligned to better support attendance

- LAUNCHED THE HEADSTART ATTENDANCE PILOT
- LAUNCHED HEALTHSTART
- PROMOTED HEATHIER TOGETHER SCHOOLS
- PLANNED THE ROLE OUT OF MECC
- EXTENDED THE REMIT OF THE SCHOOLS MENTAL HEALTH NETWORK TO INCLUDE ALL HEALTH
