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
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



Our top tips

We shared some PGM experiences and learning lessons boiling these down to some 'top tips' on cards that were typed up after the workshop – here's what we came up with.....





Top tips 1-5

1	The success of PGM is measured in relationships built and personal journeys not just the impact of the grants and money moved.
2	Let's keep talking (supporting) about the people who look after the people – mental health support for the supporters.
3	You have two ears and one mouth – listen more than you talk, be curious and know you and your opinion are valued and valid.
4	Build and communicate a container for the process including what cannot be done. Be pushed and challenged to reshape the container.
5	It's important to meet people where they are – adapt, change, grow, evolve with participants (young people).

Top tips 6-10

6	Long live PGM whatever it looks like. Learn from others. Change the process for the better.
7	It always looks different even though it follows some key principles.
8	Removing barriers to inclusion. Payment for involvement Gift – bravery by Jan and Ali to work through all the issues and worries involved in enabling people to be involved (referring to the York Deciding Together experience)
9	People are very nervous / scared when applying for funding. How do we take time to put all people / groups at ease and give confidence to go through the process?
10	Value residents / people. TRUST.

Top tips 11-15

11	Failure is an option!
12	Recipients of services provided / funded can advise on how good they are.
13	Give everyone the chance to be involved. Have an incentive!
14	Payment for involvement. It is a thank you for your participation and shared experience. Include payments for transport and more often than not refreshments.
15	Funders should be using PGM in at least some of their work; even if it's just a pilot!

Top tips 16-18

16	Be as proactive, mindful and purposeful as possible in regards to who's around the
	table – be as representative, diverse and inclusive as possible! Set the ball rolling with power.

17	To do PGM properly it needs to be properly resourced with ongoing facilitation and
	development support.
18	I hope that as a local authority we get to a place – ready – to engage in PGM. I think
	we have a select few who would be up for it so it's turning that into a reality or at
	· ·
	least a more consistent reality.

The time flew too quickly, but there is a strong appetite to ask more questions of each other and discover the very different ways we all appear to approach PGM.

We are interested, and sometimes differ, in our opinions about PGM philosophy, ambition and aspiration, its practice, its process(es), its language (lots on this!), its merits, drawbacks and its development for the future.

We want to know more about the way in which people come together, how they decide to decide together and make community grant awards. But we're also clear that PGM is much more than the awards themselves. It seems to be a tool, alongside other approaches, for achieving something much wider and socially just.

We seem to agree that PGM is more participatory than traditional community grantmaking but does it, or could it, shift power?

We're not certain yet....





Thank you to all who were able to come to the workshop or wanted to but couldn't quite make it on the day....perhaps this is the start of a community of practice?

In the room we had people with lived experience of PGM, applicants for community grants, community development workers / 'bridge builders' and people who have worked on the ground to facilitate PGM in places, and investors.

We had examples between us of place based PGM and thematic PGM where it has been aimed at a particular issue such as mental health / and / or communities of interest. It was fascinating but we just scratched the surface!
